## The Bourne Chronicle

The Bourne Chronicle is one of a number of books written and researched by Rex Needle who sadly passed away earlier this year. Below is a selection from the book, highlighting events from 50, 100, 150 and 200 years ago. 1971:

- Health Centre opens in St Gilbert's Road to centralise doctors' surgeries.
- Heating system installed at the outdoor swimming pool.
- Jack Wand takes over hardware and electrical shop in North Street.

#### 1921:

- Beguest from Thomas M Baxter finances Lady Chapel in the Abbey Church.
- New grammar school opens in South Road with temporary wooden classrooms.
- Survey of the weekly street market shows 62 stalls occupying 225 feet.
- Congregational Sports Club founded, mainly for bowls and tennis.
- Bourne Town Band re-formed (disbanded in 1939).
- Woman dies from sleeping sickness after 35 days.
- Several water boreholes dry up after prolonged drought.

### 1871:

- Bourne Temperance Club playing soccer matches against local teams.
- Smallpox outbreak among a family living in North Road but all recover.
- Joseph Flatters, church bellringer and town bandsman, emigrates to Canada.

## 1821:

Town Hall built after being financed by public subscription.

In the month of May Bourne's BRM Motor Racing Team regularly left the town taking their cars to Monaco to compete in its Grand Prix Motor Race. These races were run on a circuit made up of the streets of the Principality. It included a tunnel and a long run along its harbour front. The first of these Grand Prix races was held in 1929. They were organised by the *l'Automobile Club de Monaco*. The circuit has changed little since then. A major addition being the safety barriers erected around most of the circuit. At least two drivers with their cars had ended in the sea in recent years so those barriers would have been welcomed by them. They escaped with little more than a good soaking. That first race in 1929 was won by an English Man, Grover Williams. He was driving a Bugatti 35B.

In the years, 1963,1964,1965, 1966 and 1972, the BRM Team returned with the Winner's Trophy. For the first three of those victories the team's driver was Graham Hill, who also won the World Championship in 1962 along with the BRM Team. In 1966 BRM's winning driver was Jackie Stewart and in 1972 the driver was the French Champion, Jean-Pierre Beltoise. That, sadly was to be the team's last Grand Prix victory. The BRM team ceased racing in 1976 leaving an enviable record In Monaco's list of winners of its Grand Prix.


