Dorothy was a beautiful alluring trailblazer and the darling of the press at the time. Her story was told as part of the Women in Motor Sport Exhibition in the Coventry museum of transport in May of this year. She is also remembered at the British Motoring Museum near Leamington Spa.

Many other ladies have followed Dorothy including Pat Moss sister of the famous racing driver Sterling Moss.

Dorothy always had her dog with her and she liked to carry chocolates and also a compact mirror as she said she could see who was behind her and this was what gave the motor manufacturing companies the idea of the rear view mirror inside the car so as to see what was behind.
