An article that appeared recently in 'Discovering Bourne' explored the history of the Klondyke and how it came about. It included the story of Ada Cole and how her discovery of seeing live horses being shipped abroad led her to build a model slaughter house in Bourne that was established in 1928. It continued in use until 1973, although nothing can be seen of it as it lies under a modern housing estate. Another small part of the history of the town.
